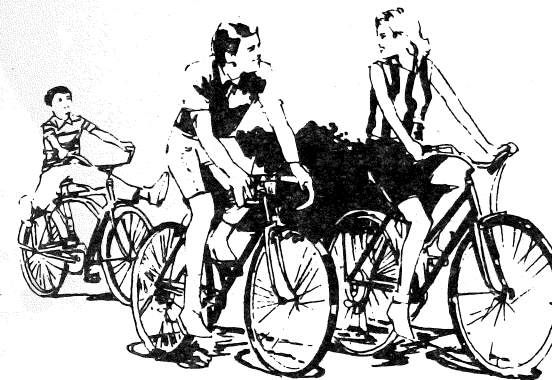

Not a whole lot happened this week.

1) Various people were appointed unanimously to various committees as follows:
