Then came the chase: "Fairly Fast and Decisively". The girl was now running faster and no longer on the path but thru a valley, into mountainous area. Up the mountains, down the mountains, more valley, over hills, climbing up cliffs in a quick and careless manner. All the while, I could feel "them" behind me. They were many, all distorted figures, following me, creeping over me. I was getting exhausted - a cliff ahead. I knew it was my end. My story had been foretold to me at the beginning. But nevertheless I climbed up and up, so often stopping to listen, but they stopped along with me. The fall-off the cliff, and down they came over me.

The piece ended the way I knew it would. It had to - I was destined to die. I couldn't even enjoy the Haydn piece, much less stay for the second half of the concert. I just wasn't there any more, so I returned to my room to rest from exhaustion from the terribly dramatic reaction.

FOOD FIXING IN AMERICA by Dr Strange

Rabbit or Hare

In the South they refer to rabbit as Old Hare, without regard to the age of the animal. In the North and West it is rabbit, whether it is tame or wild.

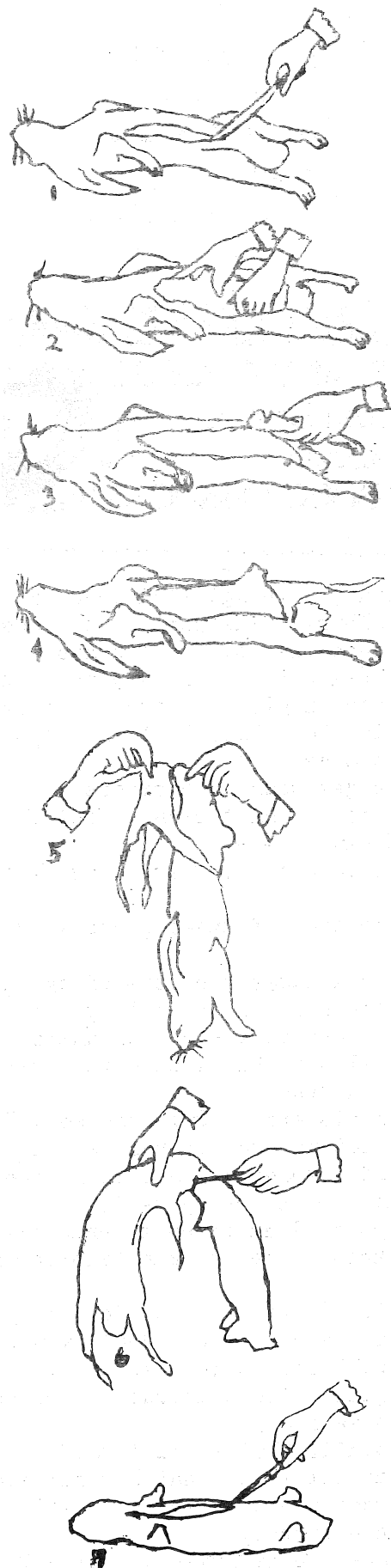
The flesh of rabbit or hare when more than a year old is dry and somewhat tough; the young ones, when nearly full-grown and fat, are tender and make rather delicate eating. A young rabbit has soft paws which are not fully opened, while the paws of an old rabbit are open and worn. The ears of a young one are very soft, while those of an old one are stiff and comparatively rough. A rabbit, in common with almost every other game, tastes better when it is a little seasoned, aged, or when the flesh is what is called high; but it must not be too much so. When the body is rather stiff, the flesh is good, but when the body is limber and the flesh has a black-bluish appearance, it is best to examine it carefully, as the meat is probably tainted.

A young rabbit that is cut into small serving pieces and cooked in a strong broth, spiced with a bouquet garni, a little mace, cloves, pepper, thyme, and onion, before it is fried in a butter and claret mixture, makes a stew that turns a cold autumn night into a heartwarming occasion. And a good rabbit pie, a helping of the universally acclaimed hasenpfeffer, a serving of fried rabbit and tartar sauce, or a roast rabbit is guaranteed to be a propitious introduction for those whose knowledge of this long-eared little animal is bounded by the covers of Uncle Remus.

Barbecued Rabbit or Hare

- 2 c. water
- 2 c. vinegar
- 12 whole peppercorns, bruised
- 1 1/3 tbsp. salt
- thinly peeled rind 1 large lemon
- 12 sprigs parsley tied with
- 2 large bay leaves
- 1 large onion, thinly sliced
- 1 medium-sized raw carrot, thinly sliced
- scant 1/2 tsp. thyme
- 3 whole cloves, heads removed
- 1/4 tsp. allspice
- 1 blade sage
- 1/4 tsp. celery seeds

Skin and clean the rabbit as shown.



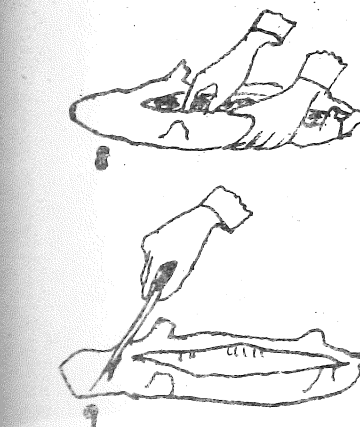
nade and roast in a moderate oven (375°) about 40 minutes, basting often with the liquid in the pan. Keep hot while preparing the barbecue sauce.

liquid in roasting pan

- 2 small cloves garlic
- 2 tbsp. catsup
- 1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- dash of Tabasco
- 2 tsp. brandy
- 2 tbsp. butter
- 1 tbsp. flour

Discard any excess fat from the liquid in the roasting pan. Measure and add enough more of the marinade to make one cup. Boil this up once with the garlic (peeled but left whole), the catsup, Worcestershire sauce, and tabasco. Strain and return to the fire with the brandy, also the butter into which the flour has been rubbed. Bring to boiling point, add more seasoning if desired, pour over the rabbit or hare, and garnish with watercress and quartered lemon.

1. Opening cut, from about breast bone to base of tail. Cut outer skin only.
2. Loosen the skin along the sides of the cut, using the fingers. A pinch of dry cornmeal in the opening will make movement of the skin easier.
3. Work skin loose from the knee and upper leg so that the knee-joint may be thrust upward. Disjoint leg at knee and work skin back as far as it will go.
4. Clean flesh from lower part of leg. Skin out other leg in same manner. With a knife or scissors, cut away any tissue at base of tail and work the skin of the tail loose.
5. Hold flesh at base of tail with firm grasp and pull steadily on skin until freed from entire after-section. Roll skin back until forelegs are reached. Clean forelegs as in 3 and 4.
6. Roll skin back to base of ears. Cut off ears as close to head as possible. Work skin over head and cut eyelids free. Avoid cutting the lid, especially if fur is to be sold. Cut skin free at the nose by cutting the cartilage, not the bones. Free skin from flesh at lips, remove all fat, and turn inside out. Trim, clean, and scrape thoroughly with a knife.
7. Slice open abdomen, from chest to tail, being careful not to pierce the entrails.
8. Remove entrails.
9. Cut off head and other parts of body to form portions as desired.

Combine all ingredients and bring to a rapid boil. Cool to lukewarm, then pour over the rabbit in a large earthen crock or bowl. Cover and let stand for 48 hours--less if a milder flavor is desired. Lift the animal out, pat dry, and rub lightly with salt and pepper. Envelop it with thin strips of bacon and place in a roasting pan which has been very thoroughly greased, preferably with bacon drippings. Add one cup of the strained mari-

CAR FIXING IN AMERICA by Paul Kneisl

Valve Adjustments

The VW Beetle is about the only modern car that requires regular valve adjustments. Since it is fairly vital that this be done on VWs, and since so many people own them (but really because whenever I get a chance to talk about VWs I exploit it to the limit), I am going to explain how the valves on a Volkswagen are adjusted. This should be done every 3,000 miles. You better have a thorough knowledge of how to do it, though.

Materials: feeler gauge, 13mm wrench, medium screwdriver, new valve cover gaskets (specify year of engine when buying)

1) Remove distributor cap by prying off the two spring clips with a screwdriver.

2) Using an adjustable wrench on the generator pulley nut, turn the engine clockwise. Note that the brown plastic rotor in the distributor turns as you do so. There is a little mark on the metal rim of the distributor. Turn the engine so the rotor points to this mark.

3) Look at the crankshaft pulley (the lower one). On the top of it, there are notches. The number of them depends on what year the engine is (1, 2, or even 3). Whatever the number, turn the engine so the LEFTTEST notch lines up with the seam in the crankcase. Measure exactly 180° around from this notch on the pulley and make a mark, like so:



4) Underneath the engine, almost directly behind the right rear wheel, you will find a valve cover (speaking of rear wheels, make sure the parking brake is on). It looks like this:



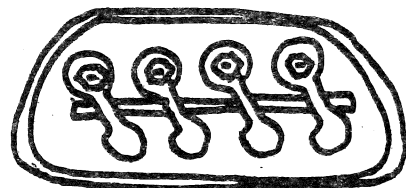

Do you see the length of wire (that looks like a coat-hanger wire) that runs across the horizontal length of the valve cover? Use the medium screwdriver to pry this wire down and the valve cover will pop off. With the valve cover off, this is what you are presented with:

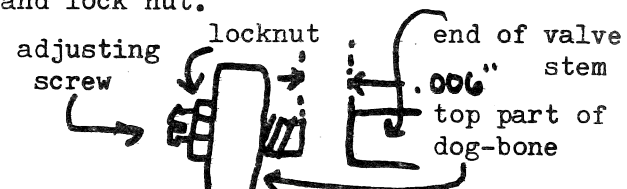

5) The things that look like vertical dog bones are rocker arms. On the top part, you will notice an adjusting screw and lock nut.



6) On the FRONTTEST two rocker arms (front is the front of the car) see if the clearance between the valve stem and the adjusting screw is .006 inches (see how to use a feeler gauge in last week's article). If it is not, loosen the lock nut with the 13mm wrench. Turn the adjusting screw with a screwdriver down on the .006" blade just a little tight. Tighten the lock nut and see if you get a .006" reading with the feeler gauge. Do this for the second valve from the front of the car, too.

7) Now you must move the crankshaft pulley 180° with the adjustable wrench, turning COUNTER CLOCKWISE. Line up the mark you made 180° from the notches with the seam in the crankcase. Now adjust the clearances on the two rocker arms nearest the rear of the car. You cannot go back to the valves you just did, unless you move the engine back 180°.

8) With the last set of valves adjusted, it is time to replace the valve cover. Remove all traces of the old gasket and fit the new one in place. Set the valve cover on the cylinder head and swing the retaining clip (coat-hanger wire) in place, prying the last inch with the screwdriver.

9) Now turn the engine COUNTER CLOCKWISE again 180° back to the original notch, so it lines up with the seam in the crankcase. Under the left side of the engine, you will find another valve cover. Remove the cover just as you did the other one.

10) Adjust the two frontest valves, following the above instructions.

11) After the two front valves are done, turn the engine 180° COUNTER CLOCKWISE to the mark you made opposite the notch. Now adjust the two valves nearest the rear of the car. Put the valve cover back on and you are finished.

Before attempting the above procedure, you should have a pretty exact idea of what is going on. The best place to learn about the VW engine is in a book called How to Keep Your VW Alive. It has a very good description of all the parts in the engine etc, etc. That's where I got my start.

Nov 20, 1975

The main topic of discussion was week-night parties in Chase-Stone. Mr Williamson has received many complaints about the noise and duration of said parties. Sleep and Study violations are handled by the Polity and the Polity Court. Although the time limits on parties are under the jurisdiction of the Assistant Deans (week-night parties are supposed to end at 12:30) the real issue is the disturbance of sleep and study. Therefore, if you have a complaint about noise, first, ask the offender to quiet down, and if he doesn't, then go to your dorm Delegate, who is responsible for enforcing the law. If the Delegate is unavailable, try to find the Polity Attorney. If you can't find him, go to the President. If he is unavailable, you have recourse to the Asst. Deans. You don't have to suffer. If this procedure is followed, the Asst. Deans should never have to hear about it. If your rights have been violated you may present your case to the Polity Attorney who may prosecute the offender before the Polity Court.

Mr Jerrems suggested that week-night parties be held in the coffee-shop, but then noted that this would conflict with the food serving operation

which lasts until 12:00. Miss Leonard asked if it was really necessary to have parties in the middle of the week.

If you have any complaints about the heat, or lack thereof, direct all complaints to Mr Jackins. There are some rooms which have no individual controls, such as Campbell and East Pinkney, but if Mr Jackins is made aware of all the problem areas, then he can regulate the system so that conditions are bearable.

Mr Williamson suggested that all material coming out of the Student Polity be dated.

Mr Williamson also said that lots of people have bought tickets for the Folger Theater trip. The last day to buy tickets is December 1.

Mr Jackins wanted to remind everyone that the dining hall will be open from 10:00-12:00 for brunch and from 5:00-6:00 for dinner, Thursday, November 27 through Sunday, November 30.
