Workers of the World!

The Student Employment Office is gearing up for its third year at St. John's. We haven't always found ideal jobs for all you selective workers (few times, to be frank), but we will keep trying.

Here is a suggestion for folks seeking part-time work. You can register at two employment offices in Annapolis. The State Employment Office, at Solomon Road and Forest Drive, collects names to be fed into their computer. Chances look slim there, but it is still worth a try. That office is open from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

MANPOWER is another employment agency, located at 2502 Kiva Road, near the Holiday Inn. This organization appears to provide more short-term jobs than regular part-time work. A person registers at their office, and then calls in periodically to inform the staff the hours they will be available to work. Their phone number is 263-2111.

The Student Employment Office receives many calls for yard work, babysitting, cleaning, etc. They do not sound exciting, but do not write them off too quickly. Combining a few smaller jobs can earn as much cash as a larger one, along with a little more variety. Hours are more flexible, and local people tend to be more generous after you have worked awhile. A group of students supported themselves this Summer doing smaller jobs in Annapolis.

CAR FIXING IN AMERICA By Paul Kneisl

Part One
Tools

Before you can start examining the particulars of any subject, be it Geometry or ditch-digging, you have to have something to work with. Henry Ford as a boy fixed clocks and made all of his screwdrivers out of nails he filed to fit each particular screw. I have a friend who, so help me, can fix anything with a ten pound sledge-hammer. These days, however, anyone can buy a complete selection of tools for almost any job. It is my intent to explain this week just what you need to own to get started in the car-fixing business.

First, what kind of car do you own? American cars use "standard" inch measurements for nuts and bolts, while European cars use metric sizes (So do Japanese). Remember to buy your sockets and wrenches in the particular sizes. Sears sells "Craftsman" tools and these are generally recognized as the best for the money. They also sell all standard and metric sizes of just about anything you would care to own. In addition, the tools carry a lifetime free replacement guarantee, in case you break them. I suggest you buy all your tools at Sears. Basic items like screwdrivers, adjustable wrenches, etc, you probably already own. These things don't need to be fancy, most of them are ordinary house tools.

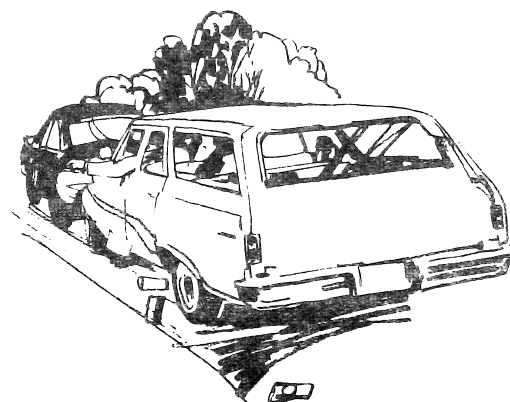
3/8" drive ratchet with 3" and 6" extensions.....\$7.00
Set of 3/8" drive sockets, sizes from 3/8" to 7/8" (metric sizes 8mm to 19mm)...\$15.00
Set of box or open-end wrenches (same sizes as above).....\$15.00
Large and small adjustable wrenches..... together \$10.00
Pair of visegrips.....\$4.00
large screwdriver
small screwdriver
Medium Phillips screwdriver
hammer
sparkplug socket, 3/8" drive
Others: tire pressure gauge; oil can with spout for adding oil (or a large funnel); oil drain pan (use your imagination); flexible tubing, about 3/8" diameter, clear type; empty Clorox bottles to pour old crank case oil into; can of Goop to clean up with.

As a rule, you don't need to purchase all of the above at once. As time goes by, the tools get added to your collection one by one. Try looking for auctions or gas station sales for the cheap-

est prices. If you really want to start spending money, after you acquire all of the above, you can start on buying the basic instruments. These are absolutely necessary for things like tuning up a car.

Dwell/Tachometer.....\$30.00
strobe light.....\$30.00
torque wrench.....\$20.00
compression tester.....\$7.00
jack stands.....\$10.00

If all this looks expensive, look at it this way: most of the operations you will do on your car involve a screwdriver and an adjustable wrench. If you only intend to do basic things like change the oil, this is about all you need. More advanced procedures like trouble-shooting and tune-ups require more expensive equipment, but you always get your money back by doing the work yourself. In short, keep the junk in your tool box in proportion to the work you intend to do.

Theatre Project, an experimental theatre company from Baltimore, will present an outdoor performance of Igor Stravinsky's L'Histoire du Soldat (The Soldier's Tale) October 5, 3:00 p.m. on the F.S.K. patio. CHARTER FOR THE SYNDICATE OF BACCHUS

ADMINISTRATION: SOB is comprised of two parts, one dealing with "Waltz and Folk" parties, the other handling "Rock and Soul" parties. There will also be a member from the Delegate Council whose sole function will be to act as a middleperson for anyone who cannot get in touch with either of the monarchs. Each part of SOB has its own funds allocated by the delegate council.

PROPAGATION: Each monarch has the right to appoint an heir to the throne, which heir will become monarch at the former's abdication or departure from school, whichever occurs first. The heir must be enrolled at St John's College in Annapolis, MD, both at the time of appointment and ascension.

PURPOSE: To promulgate the spiritual well-being of the student body, by aiding the party life of the college. Said aid is to be realized in monetary assistance. Each monarch has the right to dole out money to any individual interested in throwing a large party. A large party is open to the entire school. The monarch has the right to demand an accounting (in the form of receipts) of all party expenses. Any individual interested in throwing a large party should seek out the appropriate monarch. SOB is also responsible for school stereo system.

NOTE: This charter may be revoked at any time by the members of the Delegate Council.

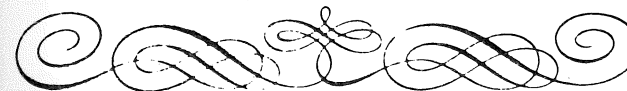
WOMEN'S SPORTS by Jacquie Blue

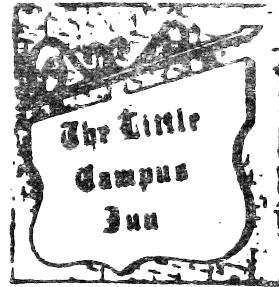
