

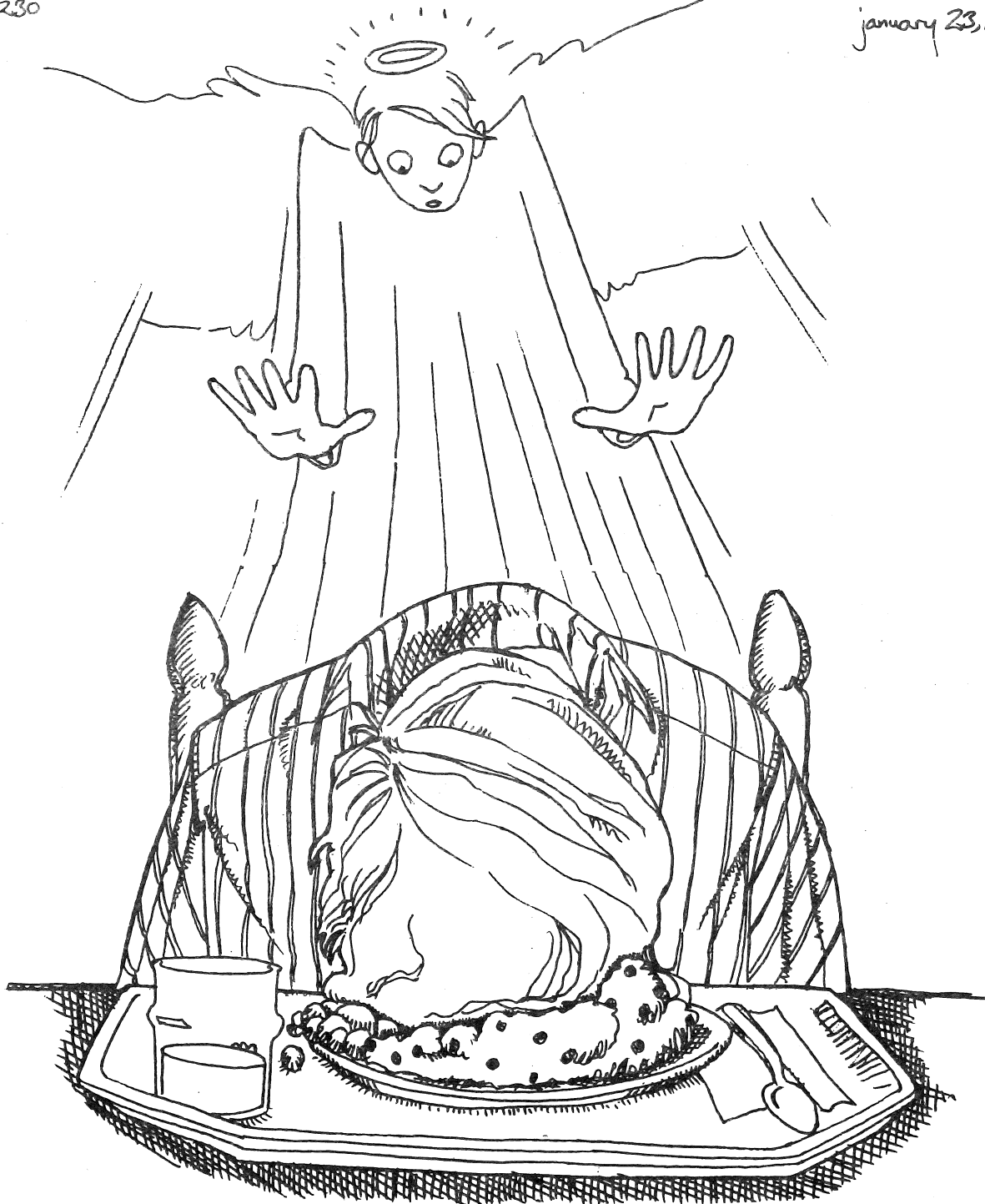

Applications will normally be approved if the applicant is in good academic standing and if the campus to which transfer is sought can accommodate the numbers that apply.

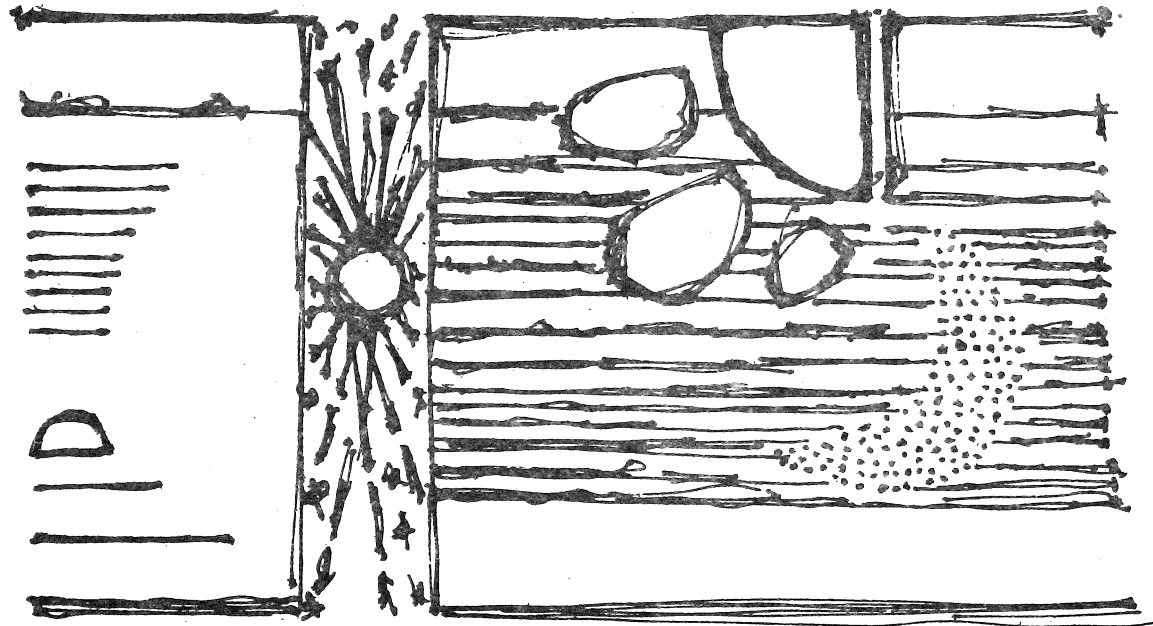

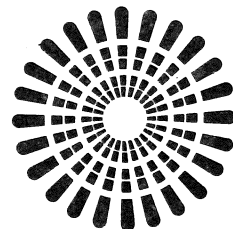
