To the Students:

Having become a candidate for the office of president of the student polity, in accordance with established procedure, it becomes my duty to make known to you my sentiments in regard to that office.

The student polity constitution invests the student government with the power to: manage the funds allotted it annually by the school administration; preside in cases concerning infractions of polity rules as outlined in the student manual; and annul or alter the constitution if ever such need arise.

As infractions, or at least flagrant infractions, of polity rules seldom occurs, and so far as I now the annulment or alteration of the present constitution has never occurred or is likely to occur, the main function of the student government, as I understand it, is very nearly administrative.

It is to that end that the incoming administration should primarily look. But the student government is, as any freely elected government should be, answerable to the students and by right should exert their efforts to the end that the majority of the students direct them. I neither can nor will make any specious promises to any of you, for such a promise once made generally proves itself false as well as proving its orator a less than honest man. What I will promise and what I propose to do if elected is to effect, as I am able, the ends to which the majority of the students, as they make themselves known, direct me.

Thoughts on the political and socioeconomic advantages of electing me, Chris Rote, to the office of Polity President.

The Student Polity desires two things from its representative delegates: a just and representative apportionment of Polity funds, and improvements of living and social conditions. Of those things which we desire, some things are possible, some things are understood and known and thus may be put into effect; others are not understood or known and thus may not be put into effect. Until the Student Polity and its representative delegates clearly know and understand what is possible for them, they will never know what can and cannot be accomplished. I, myself, do not know what I can and cannot accomplish as President of the Polity. However, this is good. It means that we can take all our ideas to the limit and see whether they are evanescent or nascent. It means that we can continue the attempt to better our society without the countervailing apathy of hopelessness.

There are a few things which the Student Polity has learned. It has learned that it can paint its checkbook either red or black. I am a firm advocate of fiscal responsibility; not only should we be responsible for our debts but, even more important, we need to look further into alternative means of procuring the necessary monies other than from the Student Polity treasury. We should be responsible to ourselves.

There are quite a few desires which may never be satisfied because the possible looks impossible. If something looks good, then let's see if we can do it.

I would like to see new and improved facilities for the students. I have ideas which I would like to see implemented, one of which is the construction of an outdoor barbecue. This is not unfeasible in the least, and its utility and need is manifest, or will become more so as spring approaches.

Inspiration and a willingness to listen and act upon the ideas of the students themselves is my platform or, to be more precise, the way I am.

Obj l.—It would seem that Chris Rote is not a serious candidate for Polity president. For he often smiles and laughs, which betokens a lack of seriousness, as at least one of his august opponents might well have said.

Obj 2.—It would seem that Chris Rote is not a serious candidate for Polity president, verily and in truth. Reply Obj 2.—On the contrary, he who will not waltz, scorns not festival, but rather its attendant potables, and means no harm thereby. For just as one man's Mede is another man's Persian (as says E B White), without that there be a need for duking it out, so may certain

epiphenomenal beverages be embraced as preferred over those obtaining at an event synchronous and elsewhere, to the nature of which the consumer being indifferent. From the which it follows that the choice of one wingding over another can be made mediately and in all good grace. And so for the contrary case.

"What considerations, then, should guide the writing of a commentary on a Platonic dialogue?

"First there is the conviction that a platenic dialogue is not a book claiming to speak for itself. This conviction was, and still is, shared by many. Inferring from a remark in Aristotle's Poetics that a 'Socratic' dialogue is akin to a mime, and nourished by information derived mainly from Diogenes Laertius and Athenaeus, historians and commentators have tried to see Platonic dialogues as drama, philosophical comedies and tragedies, or at least to establish that their relation to mime, comedy and tragedy is."

"What is playfully enacted through Theodorus' behavior before and after Socrates' 'imitation of Protagoras' is the self-refutation of Protagoras. The self-contradictory character of his doctrine is revealed in deed (()) before it is formulated in words (171 a6—c7), which words Theodorus thinks deals a little too harshly with his friend (171 c8). Theodorus does not realize, it seems, that his own inactivity and subsequent activity are much more damaging to the status of his friend's opinions."

The way they appear to you is not the way they appear to us, because you take as true what is false, as serious what is funny, and as real what is phony. And vice versus. Mr Levine happily demonstrates the uses of the former two funky categories, and helps re-emphasize those eternal, if somethimes over-looked, verities: appearances are not necessarily reality, thought is not necessarily realized in action, much less in truth, and words are not always fulfilled in deeds--by showing toadyism turned to B& -ing. Discourse is St John's stock in trade, but all too often the general corollary rears its head; talk comes cheap.




