



SENIOR FUND-RAISING CONTEST

THE FOOD CO-OP will be clearing all members' accounts in the next couple of weeks. A. If you placed an order at the 24 April ordering meeting you will have updated your debts and credits and settled with the amount you gave the co-op then. If there is any new credit due you because the supplier lacked some item for this mick-up; the co-op will give you a check for that amount at the pick-up on May 5. If you wish to buy surplus foods at this pick-up you will not be able to charge it so bring a blank check with you. B. If you are a member who did not place

an order at the 24 April meeting --1. and the co-op records show you are due credit, you will receive a check for that amount in a few days.

2. and the co-op records show you owe the co-op money, you will receive a bill (if you have not already done so) and the date by which this must be paid is May 4. It is important we have this money to pay these to whom the co-op owes money.


Note: If you have a back order from a distant monthe but did not convert that to a written credit claim in that distant month, you have forfeited any claim for a refund on this. But this policy seems to have been unclear to some members. (It has been in writing the past two months.) As a result, the co-op will try to honor properly supported claims of unfilled back ordered food. No oral claims of money due for unrecieved food will be considered. If you have your back early order sheet with the co-op's indication the item is to be reordered. that will establish your claim. You must convey this to Rick Campbell by Friday. 4 May, at the latest. On that weekend the co-op will see if it has enough money to pay all properly supported claims. If not, it will pay the same percentage of all debts.



TOWARDS A DURABLE PEACE

An ancient procedure for advancing knowledge is to identify problems. Problems generate solutions, answers which should increase our understanding of the world. Today our society is faced with a problem that threatens the stability of our work and well-being: the energy problem. Like a hydra, this problem confronts us in many ways, its supply, its processing, transportation, safety, and even its intrinsic desirability. Three mile island surfaced

like a sea-beast for many people, but the problems of nuclear energy are hidden only to those unwilling to consider them. This accident will perhaps convince us of the worth of this enterprise, and the urgency of understanding our present situation.

The hydra of energy problems almost escapes our ability to define it. We can zero in on a thousand particular troubles, a thousand particular needs. In lieu of precisely viewing the difficulty let us consider out attempts to overcome it. One description says; "ever more remote and fragile places are to be ransacked, at ever greater risk and cost, for increasingly elusive fuels, which are then to be converted to premium forms -electricity and fluids - in ever more costly, complex, centralized, and gigantic plants. The side effects of these efforts become increasingly intolerable even as their output alledgedly becomes ever more essential to our way of life and our very survival."

That is how Amory Lovins, a technician and energy consultant, describes our present path in his book "Soft Energy Paths". Now I agree with this description, as I'm sure you do. The trouble is that it's a brutal, unattractive picture. The is itself a problem. And thus Mr. Lovins's book. He writes his book with the goal of demonstrating the undesirable consequences of our present energy program, and to suggest an elegant alternative. His writing is cogent, thoughtful, and clearly id ntifies what is at stake - the social, political, and economic fabric of our lives. His book has catalyzed my interest and concern in this area, and I would like to discuss it in the hope that it will provoke your concern also. If it does, I have requested that the Library order this book; please ask and see if they have it yet.

Two energy systems confront us. They are labeled "hard" and "soft". Let's take up hard energy. This term is meant to denote the characteristics of our present energy system. Hard energyis non-renewable, energy that is inappropriately matched with the needs and desires for which we use it, energy that is centralized and renders us dependent on distant, often exotic and unapproachable technologies. Coal, gas, oil, and most especially, nuclear energy, are examples of this.

On the side of efficiency, cost, and appropriatemess our hard systems look very poor; centralized power systems demand complex "exotic" technology, huge capitwl investments, long lead times from ordering to operation, large distribution costs, low effeciency on conversion of primary energy into end-use energy (ie. liquid fuels, electricity, and heat). This becomes most clear in low-level heating and cooling. Here we seek to create a temperature difference of tens of degrees, yet they are often created "by a flame temperature of thousands, or a nuclear reactor's temperature equivalent to trillions". Socially, our "centralized energy systems are inequitable in principle because they seperate the energy output from its side effects". Politically it has made us so dependent on the constant function of these huge plant that national security is often dictated by our energy demands. It has destabilized many of the third world and developing countries, forcing us into relation with immoral and antagonistic nations. This is a system undesirable in itself and in its consequences: a world where the use of force becomes increasingly necessary in order to protect energy sources that have become vital to national security.

Soft energy, on the other hand, has five characteristics quite opposed to this. (A) Diversity, (B) Renewability, (C) Simplicity and Comprehensibility,

(3) Appropriate End-Use Quality, (E) Appropriate End-Use Quantity. Lovins convincingly argues that soft energy use "widespread or readily learned skills", that it is non-inflationary (we have recently seen how energy to its can increase inflation dramatically), that it's not politically destabilizing (the success in India of small community methane plants illustrates this fact), and that it will reduce our trade deficit.

Lovins makes this argument using the goals and the criteria of the hard energy lobbyists. This done in order to persuade his opponents with their own facts, figures, and values (ie. a gluttonous energy-consuming economy where well-being is measured in Btus's). He makes it clear however, that his prejudices are somewhat different. Here are three of his biases:

1)"we are more endangered by too much energy too soon than by too little too late, for we understand too little the wise use of power".

2)"we know next to nothing anout the carefully designed natural systems and cycles on which we depend",

3) "people are more important than goods".

These are value judgements, decisions about what is most desirable, what is the most rational corse for mankind. So far I have not presented a complete argument against, nor a complete argument for either har or soft energy paths. Frankly I feel that beyond my means. What I hope I have done is to engage you in the consideration of the implications of our present energy system. It could well be that no area of our economy so symbolizes the present nature, and the present danger, of our society. It is impossible to thoughtfully accept the ugliness that pervades our physical and social environment. It is impossible to believe in freedom while enslaving certain regions for our energy needs. The world has come scorn our attitude of benign leadership, can we complain as long as our energy policy destabilizes vast areas of the world and threatens ancient cultures with corruptive, inappropriate technologies.

For many years we have been persuaded of the inevitablity of our demands and of our present solutions to those demands. There is no manifest destiny in energy, nor any in society. We must realize that there are choices to be made, that there is still time to change to a fitting and elegant design. Not all paths remain open forever, however, it may well be that we face with an urgent decision, before the possibility of erecting a humane and beautiful environment becomes lost for reasons of cost, security and our addictive dependency.


