Malibu Council directs staff to pursue two-step voting process for \$125 million sewer project

The Malibu City Council has unanimously directed staff to pursue a two-step voting process for a proposed \$125 million sewer project aimed at helping fire-damaged beachfront properties rebuild, though Mayor Bruce

Silverstein raised concerns about the fairness of the vote that will ultimately decide the project's fate. The proposed 5.5-mile wastewater collection system would serve 461 waterfront residential and commercial properties along Pacific Coast Highway between Carbon

SMMUSD Board removes reading interventionists from layoff list, approves two other cuts

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education voted recently to preserve Language and Literacy Interventionist (LLI) positions after an outpouring of opposition from parents, teachers and students who argued the proposed cuts would devastate reading support for the district's most vulnerable learners. The board approved an amended resolution, removing LLI positions from a proposed list of certificated layoffs. The positions will remain in place while the board receives further information about the


Live to serve: A visionary series on transformation, service, and returning to one's calling at The Crow

On Sunday evening at The Crow in Santa Monica, a room known for holding intimate truths will become the starting point of something larger - not a performance in the conventional sense, but a public act of becoming and a platform for others to share their journeys of living a life of service. Live to Serve: Building the Life You Were Meant to Lead is a three-part spoken word and musical series unfolding March 1, May 3, and June 10, designed as a living preparation for a TEDx Transformation Talk this summer at UCLA on July 26. This is not about rehearsing a speech, but rehearsing a way of being. At its core, Live to Serve explores

the power of pivots, the moments when life redirects us back to our truest alignment, often through discomfort, loss, or awakening. It asks a question many quietly carry, "Why does it so often take trauma or tragedy to return us to what we were always meant to do." The opening evening will blend spoken word, storytelling, and a return to the piano, marking a full circle moment. Before her work in civic leadership, insurance resilience, real estate and development, and community rebuilding, Michelle Edgar's earliest training was as a concert pianist. Music was her first discipline, her first language of devotion, long before leadership took shape in boardrooms or public service. That return to the piano is not

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FBI searches Los Angeles school district headquarters and the superintendent's home

The FBI served search warrants Wednesday at the Los Angeles Unified School District's headquarters and the home of its leader, a former Superintendent of the Year who was knighted by Spain for his work.

The nature of the federal investigation involving the nation's second-largest school district and Superintendent Alberto Carvalho's home was not immediately clear. The district said in a statement that it "is cooperating with the investigation and we do not have further information at this time." The FBI also searched a third location near Miami, where Carvalho previously led the public schools.

TV news footage showed agents in FBI shirts and jackets outside Carvalho's home in the San Pedro neighborhood about 20 miles (32 kilometers) south of downtown LA. There was no visible sign of agents outside the LA district's headquarters as of mid-morning.

Rukelt Dalberis, a spokesperson for the FBI's Los Angeles field office, confirmed that agents were at the properties to serve warrants but declined to comment further because affidavits laying out details for the basis for the searches were under seal.

Before taking the helm of the Los Angeles district in 2022, Carvalho oversaw Miami-Dade County Public Schools, Florida's largest school district, from 2008 to 2021. During his tenure, he was credited with improving graduation rates and academic performance. The national superintendents association named him Superintendent of the Year in 2014, and Spain knighted the Portugal-born administrator in 2021 for his work in expanding Spanish-language programs for Miami-Dade County schools.

In California, Carvalho has stood out as a harsh critic of the Trump administration's aggressive immigration crackdown, especially following raids in Los Angeles last year. When its 500,000 students returned to classes in the fall, Carvalho urged immigration authorities not to conduct enforcement activity within a two-block radius of schools.

"I would be the biggest hypocrite in the world, regardless of my position today, if today I did not fight for those who find themselves in the same predicament I faced over 40 years ago when I arrived in this country at the age of 17 as an undocumented immigrant," Carvalho said at a news conference last year.

Carvalho arrived in Los Angeles at a critical moment, as the district found itself flush with funding from state and federal COVID-19 relief money but still struggling with the impacts of the pandemic, including learning losses and declining enrollment. He previously sparred with Florida Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis over his order that schools not require masks during the pandemic.

Officials with the Miami-Dade school system did not immediately respond to emails seeking comment on whether the FBI or other federal agencies have contacted them regarding Carvalho.

James Marshall, an FBI spokesman in Miami, told the AP that agents searched a residence in Southwest Ranches, which is in Broward County west of Fort Lauderdale, on Wednesday morning and "have since cleared the scene." He said no further information was available.

Wednesday's search was the second time in a week the Justice Department has taken action against the LA school district. On Feb. 19, the Trump administration joined a lawsuit alleging that the district discriminates against white students under its decades-old desegregation policy.

Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass's office said it had no information about the search, noting the public school system operates independently of city government.

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California is 'nowhere near' emissions goals. It's still sending organic waste to landfills

As someone who has spent years working in the waste management sector, I've watched California make bold climate commitments while simultaneously maintaining policies that undermine our state's ability to deliver on them.

It's frustrating and, frankly, it's hurting our credibility as a climate leader.

Gov. Gavin Newsom's recent pledge at a United Nations climate conference to cut methane emissions and accelerate "circular economy" systems was inspiring. But here's the uncomfortable truth: We're nowhere near meeting our targets, particularly when it comes to organic waste management.

California needs to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to 259 million metric tons of CO2 by 2030 — that's 40% below 1990 levels.

We've made some progress, with 2022 emissions sitting 14% below 1990 levels, but we still face a staggering 112 million metric ton gap. That's an enormous reduction to achieve in just six years.

What's even more troubling is our track record on organic waste diversion.

BACKTRACKING ON ORGANIC WASTE

Senate Bill 1383, which passed in 2016, required us to reduce landfilled organic waste by 50% by 2020 and 75% by 2025, compared to 2014 levels.

But we've gone backward: Organic waste going to landfills increased by a million tons from 2014 to 2020. The 2025 goal? It's not happening.

This isn't a technology problem. California has the circular processing capacity we need. The real problem is our policies are preventing this infrastructure from being used effectively.

The root cause is California's exclusive franchise hauling system, which is rigidly enforced through state law and municipal contracts. This system forces waste generators to use specific haulers, but their logistics often conflict with circular processing goals.

The result: pre-consumer food waste that could be diverted to recycling facilities gets routed to landfills instead.

Cities and counties are complying with collection service requirements yet continue falling far short of state organic-waste reduction targets. Proven circular solutions like RE:CIRCLE exist, yet hundreds of thousands of tons of high-value, pre-consumer food waste remain systematically excluded from these pathways and are landfilled each year.

Think about the climate impact we're missing.

If we divert just one million tons of organic food waste from landfills, we

could prevent 330,000 to 540,000 metric tons of CO2 emissions in California.

If we had achieved that 75% organic waste reduction goal, we could have cut carbon emissions by 5 million to 15 million metric tons.

We're creating a fundamental contradiction in our environmental policy. We set aggressive climate targets and talk about promoting circular economy principles then maintain regulatory structures that prioritize existing business models over environmental outcomes.

Local enforcement agencies make this worse through permitting practices that don't align with statewide climate priorities. I've seen high-performing circular processors face regulatory barriers that prevent them from expanding capacity.

This isn't just about missing numbers; it's about credibility.

California's international climate leadership depends on our ability to deliver on what we promise at home. When we fail to implement our own legislation, it weakens our position when we try to push other states toward more aggressive climate action.

The solution starts with recognizing that sustainable transformation requires ecosystem collaboration, not exclusionary licensing. We need policy reforms that put environmental outcomes first.

That means establishing a pre-consumer food waste carve-out that allows generators of organic waste to send it directly to high-diversion processors, bypassing franchise restrictions when environmental benefits can be proven.

No sabotaging climate commitments. Also, communities should align local permitting practices with statewide climate priorities through better coordination between CalRecycle and local authorities. And California should recognize high-performing circular processors as climate-critical infrastructure, making it easier to expand when they meet strict performance standards.

California has the technology, infrastructure and expertise to become a circular economy leader. What we're missing is policy alignment that allows our existing capabilities to work.

As we approach the critical 2030 deadline, we can't let regulatory inertia sabotage our climate commitments. The infrastructure for success is already here. We just need the political courage to unleash it.

symbolic, but structural. The series traces how creativity resurfaces when alignment is restored, and how service becomes the throughline across different chapters of life. From global entertainment and sports, to wildfire recovery and rebuilding Los Angeles' burn areas, to pivoting in insurance and serving homeowners across burn areas, to writing on real estate, development, and community resilience, Edgar's work has increasingly converged around a single philosophy: Live to Serve.

The evening will open with remarks from award winning songwriter, author, philanthropist, and longtime Palisadian Jimmy Dunne, who will speak on service, community, and what it means to belong to a place through contribution.

"The Palisades is the Palisades because of the people in its family," Dunne has said. "It's extraordinary, caring, passionate, creative, genuine. That is also a description of Michelle. She makes a meaningful difference in everything she touches."

The series is hosted at The Crow, whose mission centers on using storytelling as a force for good. For CEO and owner Nicole Blaine, the alignment was immediate.

"Having the opportunity to work with Michelle on her story has been a gift," Blaine shared. "Her ability to turn tragedy into triumph is inspiring and in full alignment with The Crow's mission, to serve others through vulnerable storytelling and bring our Santa Monica community together."

What distinguishes Live to Serve is its transparency. The process is not hidden, but for people to learn and implement in their lives. Over the coming months, audiences are invited into the inner work behind transformation; the discipline, the rewiring, the quiet daily practices required to stand on a global stage with integrity and truth. What is being built publicly mirrors what is being built privately, alignment between who we are, what we say, and how we lead. Rather than framing transformation as something that happens after success, the series reframes it as the prerequisite.

"Michelle Edgar embodies the very essence of transformation," said Aasia Stormm, Founder of TEDx Larchmont Village and PhD candidate. "Her work is not simply about rebuilding after disruption. It is about awakening, re aligning, and choosing purpose before life forces the lesson."

Stormm, who curates The Transformation Talks, sees the series as part of a larger cultural moment.

"Transformation is not born from tragedy alone," she added. "It is born from the courage to listen when life begins to redirect."

That ethos carries into the culminating

TEDx Larchmont Village event on July 26 at UCLA's Lani Hall at The UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music (<https://www.tedx.com/edx/events/65572>). The Transformation Talks bring together visionary thinkers, creators, and changemakers exploring the turning points that redefine individuals, communities, and the collective human story. The event will be livestreamed, with accompanying social gatherings.

Edgar's professional work mirrors the themes she explores on stage. A Los Angeles based civic leader, culture architect, and strategic operator, she works at the intersection of public service, business, and community transformation. As Strategy Lead at Venbrook Insurance Services, she focuses on wildfire recovery, resilience financing, and builder's risk programs tied to the rebuilding of Los Angeles and upcoming global events including LA28. She is the Founder and CEO of Edgar Talent Agency and Community Collective, platforms designed to connect capital, culture, and civic action across industries.

She also serves as a Santa Monica Arts Commissioner and a California state board appointee, with ongoing work expanding workforce access, public trust, and community engagement. In parallel, she writes for two newspapers covering real estate, development, hospitality, and the burn areas reshaping Southern California, while planning the next Community Collective convening in April tied to Route 66, where she serves as Vice Chair for Santa Monica Travel and Tourism's Route 66 initiatives.

Yet Live to Serve steps away from titles and toward essence.

The series suggests that everyone has a calling, and that alignment is less about ambition than attention. It challenges the assumption that suffering must precede purpose, while acknowledging that awakening often arrives uninvited. Above all, it offers a reminder that service is not self erasure, but self realization.

The room will not be asked to witness a finished story, but invited into the middle of one: a return, recalibration, and shared recognition that transformation is not a destination, but a daily practice.

The first installment of Live to Serve opens Sunday evening at The Crow in Santa Monica. The three part series continues May 3 and June 10, leading into TEDx Larchmont Village's Transformation Talks on July 26 at UCLA.

Beach Terrace and Getty Villa Drive. The area was heavily impacted by the January 2025 Palisades Fire, which damaged 67% of residential and 40% of commercial properties in the project zone.

Council Member Marianne Riggins made a motion directing staff to pursue a "bifurcated" approach requiring two separate votes from affected property owners. The first vote would fund approximately \$10 million to \$12 million in preliminary design and engineering costs. A second vote would follow later to approve the estimated \$125 million construction phase. Mayor Silverstein seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

"Let's go find out how much it's going to cost and then give people a second chance to vote on it," said Council Member Doug Stewart, who recommended the two-step approach.

Under California's Proposition 218, assessment district votes are weighted by each property's share of the total assessment rather than one vote per property. Only property owners who cast ballots are counted, with a simple majority of votes cast required for approval.

Silverstein expressed discomfort with that threshold, particularly given that many affected properties are now vacant lots following the fire.

"You might get 10% or 20% of the assessed properties as the entirety of who's voting, and therefore seven and a half or 8% of the assessed properties control the decision," Silverstein said. "That's crazy."

The mayor said he would support the initial design phase vote but signaled he

would push for stricter requirements before the larger construction vote.

"I'm gonna be insisting on a more stringent vote," Silverstein said. "I may get outvoted, but I'm going to do that."

Brian Forbath, a senior partner at Stradling Law Firm serving as the city's bond counsel, confirmed the council could impose additional voting thresholds beyond the constitutional minimum. He noted that Manhattan Beach requires 60% approval before proceeding with similar assessment districts.

The project offers potential cost savings for property owners. Individual assessments are estimated at approximately \$300,000 per property, significantly less than the \$625,000 to \$1.5 million cost of replacing private septic systems and constructing protective seawalls.

Council Member Steve Uhring voiced strong support for the project.

"This thing is going to have a huge benefit in cleaning up the ocean," Uhring said. "Whether they need it or don't need it, they can help us make that ocean cleaner, safer, better for everybody."

The council intentionally limited the project to beachside properties affected by the fire, excluding the land side of Pacific Coast Highway. Council members emphasized the sewer is meant strictly to help fire victims rebuild their properties, not to expand capacity in the city.

"We're not going to change the whole city," Uhring said.

Financing the project presents challenges. Forbath said the bonds would likely be unrated debt given the lack of completed homes on many affected properties.

"A property that's occupied and built with a home on it and people living there is much more valuable security for investors than a vacant parcel," Forbath said.

The city is pursuing Clean Water State Revolving Fund financing, which offers low-interest loans at roughly half the state's general obligation borrowing rate. The city successfully used similar financing for its Civic Center wastewater treatment plant.

Council Member Marianne Riggins urged staff to finalize interim septic solutions so property owners can begin rebuilding before the sewer line is completed.

"I don't want people waiting until 2031 to start building," Riggins said.

Staff estimated it would take approximately six to nine months to reach the first property owner vote. The full project timeline spans roughly 54 months if funding is secured and no major issues arise during design or construction.

Tatiana Holden, interim public works director, noted that the Governor's Executive Order suspended permitting requirements under the California Environmental Quality Act and Coastal Act for rebuild properties, potentially shortening the timeline.

The city has already spent approximately \$200,000 on preliminary design work. Following Monday's direction, staff will issue requests for proposals to hire a design consultant and assessment engineer before returning to council with cost estimates for the first phase.

The project's fate will ultimately rest with property owners in the proposed assessment district, not the council.

district's plan for tiered reading and language supports.

The amended resolution does eliminate a counselor position and a single subject Spanish teaching position, effective June 2026, as part of a broader effort to address an \$11 million structural budget deficit.

Language and Literacy Interventionists have provided supplemental pull-out reading instruction to fourth and fifth graders scoring in the lowest percentiles on state and district reading assessments. District officials had argued the program was becoming redundant following the adoption of a new phonics curriculum, updated English Language Development instruction and a broader shift toward delivering intervention support inside the general education classroom rather than in separate pull-out sessions.

Superintendent Antonio Shelton defended the proposed restructuring as a product of rigorous program review, saying it reflected an evolution in best practices for reading instruction.

"These evaluations are not about eliminating support," Shelton told the board. "They're about ensuring that the support we provide to students is effective, aligned and implemented with fidelity."

Critics pushed back hard. Educators and parents argued that classroom teachers cannot realistically absorb the specialized, intensive work performed by LLIs on top of their existing responsibilities.

Opponents also raised concerns about a 2022 change in testing criteria that switched the district's universal screener from the FastBridge assessment to the STAR assessment, shifting the eligibility threshold for LLI services from the 25th percentile to the 10th percentile — dramatically shrinking the number of qualifying students.

Teachers pointed to a stark disconnect between the eligibility data and actual student performance. At one elementary school, nearly half of all students failed to meet state ELA benchmarks, yet only three students currently qualified for tier three LLI support under the revised criteria.

Several board members expressed unease with the pace of the proposed restructuring and the lack of a fully developed replacement plan.

Board member Richard Tahvildaran-Jesswein signaled his opposition to the original proposal during deliberations, saying he was not prepared to move forward without greater clarity for the community.

"If I'm pushed to this evening, I believe I'll be on a no vote," Tahvildaran-Jesswein said.

Board member Jennifer Smith said she felt the LLIs' role had evolved without a coherent district-wide vision and expressed concern about students losing academic ground during any transition. Board member Laurie Lieberman echoed those concerns, saying the board needed a fuller picture of how the district's entire reading intervention program would function going forward.

"I just don't feel like we're ready," Lieberman said. "I don't see the whole yet well enough."

Board member Jon Kean acknowledged the community's fears but urged colleagues to trust the superintendent's programmatic review, noting the district had navigated a similar restructuring of reading specialist positions three years earlier.

"Taking action tonight does not foreclose anything," Kean said. "It's basically just saying we hear the superintendent, we hear our staff, that they believe this is a program that needs some adjustment."

Board member Stacy Rouse cautioned against characterizing the changes as a retreat from reading instruction, arguing the district has been building a more robust, classroom-embedded approach for several years.

"When you hear 'cutting reading,' that sounds horrible," Rouse said. "We're really looking at redundancies and programs and growth, and we have been moving toward this for a while."

Following the vote, board members directed staff to further evaluate the district's reading intervention model and ensure resources are aligned with student needs, instructional priorities and long-term fiscal stability.

The issuance of preliminary notices for the two eliminated positions initiates a statutory staffing process required under California Education Code and does not necessarily determine final staffing assignments for the upcoming school year. The district faced a March 15 deadline under state education law to issue those notices.

A separate item addressing the proposed layoff of 21 classified custodial staff members was continued to the board's March 3 regular meeting. Board member Maria Leon-Vazquez was not present at the Feb. 19 meeting.






