

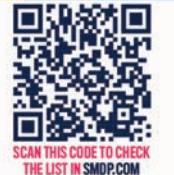

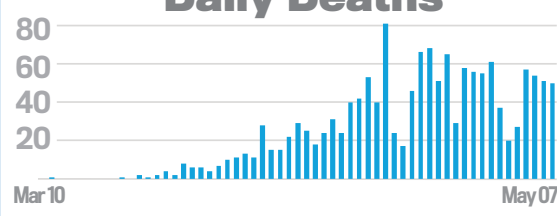

LA County Daily Deaths



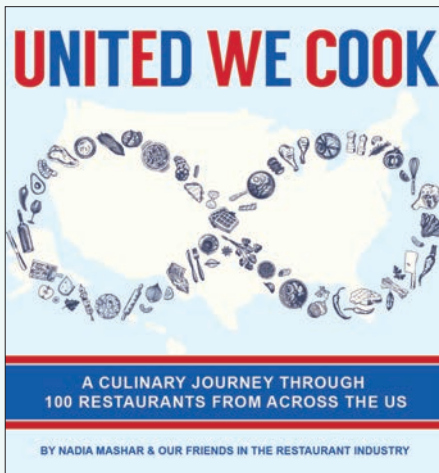
New cookbook provides revenues to restaurants and local food banks

A book that began as a far-fetched thought in the mind of a former Westside resident has now resulted in the collaboration of nearly 100 restaurants across the country who are all looking to help the communities they serve. “United We Cook,” is a digital cookbook that features recipes from 100 independent restaurants representing 37 cities across the country, including Santa Monica. The book was created by Nadia Mashar and all of the book’s proceeds will be evenly split between participating restaurants and various food banks in the

cities they serve. “Obviously, I’ve had a lot more time to go for walks so I was seeing a crazy number of restaurants who were having to shut down because they weren’t getting any business,” Mashar said. “I have friends who own restaurants and it was just heartbreaking to hear their stories about how their entire life savings just went down the drain; I really wanted to do something.” So, Mashar began ordering takeout twice a day before she got the idea to create a book that would list the recipes of people’s favorite restaurants. Having moved to Dallas

Newsom says expect more openings

The most significant reopening of the California economy during the coronavirus pandemic started Friday with tens of thousands of businesses cleared to open with limitations and Gov. Gavin Newsom expressing optimism it might not take long for the state to reach the next level that includes eating in restaurants and shopping in stores.

Nearly two dozen counties want to move further, which the state will allow if they can meet strict criteria on the number of cases, deaths and tests, Newsom said.

“We want to see counties work with us to move a little bit quicker,” Newsom said. “I know there’s deep anxiety that people are feeling, a desire to reopen.”

The governor gave his daily news briefing from a Sacramento flower shop, one of the retailers opening for curbside pickup under the new order, just in time for Mother’s Day.

Santa Monica’s COVID-19 death toll rises to 11

Eleven Santa Monica residents have died from COVID-19, with two deaths reported this week. As of Thursday, 16 people in Santa Monica nursing homes had also died from COVID-19, but it is unknown how many permanently

resided in the city and are therefore included in its official death toll. Ten people have died at the Rehabilitation Center of Santa Monica, three died at Beachwood Post-Acute & Rehab and three died at Ocean Pointe Healthcare Center. Across Los Angeles County, 49% of the 1,468 people who have died from COVID-19 resided in nursing

homes. At about 9 per 100,000 people, Santa Monica’s death rate adjusted for age distribution is the highest of any Westside city. Malibu’s adjusted death rate is 4.5, Culver City’s is 5.5, Beverly Hill’s is 6.5 and West Hollywood’s is about 7. Throughout Los Angeles County, death rates vary significantly based

on race and income. Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying from COVID-19 at a rate of 89 per 100,000 people. The death rate for African Americans is 18 and the rate for Latinos is 15.5. Asians and whites have death rates of 12 and 9, respectively.

PET TIP OF THE WEEK: PET EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Emergencies and evacuations happen. One way to prepare your pet is to make an pet emergency kit with at least one week's worth of their essentials.

Put a sign outside of your home that is easily visible for first responders that lists all pets inside of your home, and where your emergency kit is located. Consult

with your veterinarian about what you should consider during an evacuation and preparing your pet's emergency kit.

Pick a sturdy bag that is big enough to fit all of your pet's essentials, and small and light enough for you to pick-up, and evacuate quickly. Pick a location for your kit that is easy to access. Clearly label your pet emergency kit with your name, your pet's name, emergency contact, veterinarian, and any other important contact information. Lists any medical conditions, medications, and doses for your pet.

The items in your pet emergency kit will vary depending on the type of pet you have. It should only include the essentials. Food, water, collapsible bowls, medication, bedding, waste management items, pet first aid kit, and photos of your pet in the event that you become separated. Include equipment that will keep your pet secure and safe during transport such as leashes, harnesses, pet carriers, and pet cages for small pets. Purchase a set of these items that are used exclusively for emergencies. Your pets should have their identification on them and on their transport equipment.

By preparing for the unexpected, you can ensure that you and your pet stay safe together despite an emergency.

Santa Monica Man Admits Orchestrating Online Romance Scam that Conned Four Women into Investing in His Bogus Companies

A Santa Monica man has agreed to plead guilty to a federal fraud charge for a romance scam in which he deceived women he met online and elsewhere into investing tens of thousands of dollars into his sham sound design and software companies, only to take the money and spend it on himself.

Antonio Mariot Wilson, a.k.a. "Dr. Tony Mariot" and "Brice Carrington," 57, agreed to plead guilty to one count of wire fraud, according to a plea agreement filed today in United States District Court.

Between May 2015 and October 2018, Wilson met four women, including on Bumble and other dating apps, and convinced them to engage in romantic relationships with him before conning them into giving him hundreds of thousands of dollars for his purported businesses, according to his plea agreement. One of Wilson's victims, whom he met at a gym where he worked as a manager, was actress Jenifer Lewis, whose credits include the television series, "Black-ish."

To create a false impression of legitimacy and prestige, Wilson falsely claimed to be a Navy SEAL, an Oxford University graduate, and an Oxford professor teaching biblical antiquities at UCLA.

Relying on the intimacy he created in his victims through these false impressions, Wilson induced his victims to invest in one of his two companies: Ultimate FX, which he claimed was a sound design company, and 2nd Life, a purported software business designed to provide animated instruction on applying for government benefits.

Wilson conned the victims to invest in these companies by making false statements, such as claiming that the ABC television network and EA Sports video game developer had used Ultimate FX for their shows and games. Wilson also falsely claimed that investors - real people whose identities he used without authorization - had valued 2nd Life at more than \$30 million and wanted to invest in the company. Wilson also falsely stated that 2nd Life had a present valuation of \$3.2 million, court documents state.

But in reality, Wilson stole the victims' money and used it to fund his own lifestyle and pay his own personal expenses, concealing the fact that he previously pleaded guilty to carrying out a very similar scheme to defraud Ultimate FX investors. Wilson served a four-year term in federal prison after pleading guilty in 2009 to wire fraud and tax evasion charges in the Northern District of California.

Wilson also admitted that he sold unregistered 2nd Life securities by distributing "shareholder agreements" and "stock purchase agreements" to the victims. After accepting his victims' funds, Wilson used the money to pay off his credit card debt, pay his rent and buy luxury items.

Through this scheme, Wilson received a total of \$387,000 from his victims.

Wilson will face a statutory maximum sentence of 20 years in federal prison upon entering his guilty plea, which will occur at a hearing to be set in the coming weeks.

The FBI investigated this matter.

This case is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Alexander C.K. Wyman of the Major Frauds Section.

SMC Seeks Applicants for Citizens Bond Oversight Committee

Santa Monica College (SMC) is seeking applications for the Citizens Bond Oversight Committee, which oversees the implementation of the bond measures that are funding capital improvement projects at the college: Measure S (2004), Measure AA (2008), and Measure V (2016).

The application deadline is Friday, May 22, 2020.

The vacancies are specifically for representatives of local business communities of Santa Monica and Malibu. Applications for additional members are encouraged, and are available at smc.edu/CBOCApp.

To qualify for appointment, an applicant must be at least 18 years old; must not be a college employee or official; and must not be a vendor, contractor or consultant to the college.

The committee was established in spring 2002—as required by state law—to oversee the implementation of Measure U, the \$160 million bond passed by an overwhelming 70 percent of Santa Monica-Malibu voters. The committee's responsibility was expanded to include oversight of Measure S, the \$135 million bond measure passed in November 2004; Measure AA, the \$295 million bond measure passed in November 2008; and Measure V, the \$345 million bond measure passed in November 2016. The bond measures are funding a wide range of projects, including replacement buildings, seismic retrofitting, safety and technology upgrades, and more.

The SMC Board of Trustees will review all applications and make the final appointments. Malibu

Malibu Re-Starts Fire Hardening Home Assessments for Residents

As part of the City of Malibu's ongoing efforts to promote community-wide wildfire preparedness, the City has re-started its no-cost Home Ignition Zone Assessment Program to help residents harden their homes against flying embers, a major cause of homes catching fire during wildfires.

During the County and State novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic stay-at-home orders, the service is provided by a single staff member, using personal protective equipment (PPE) and maintaining physical distancing to help slow the spread of the coronavirus and protect seniors and vulnerable groups.

"Wildfires don't care about stay-at-home orders, and our next fire is always around the corner, so we need to continue to do everything possible to enhance wildfire preparedness Malibu," said Mayor Karen Farrer. "I am proud that the City is able to offer this incredibly valuable service for our community members even under these incredibly difficult circumstances."

During wind-driven wildfires such as the Woolsey Fire, powerful, sustained winds can send burning embers travelling up to a few miles ahead of the fire front. According to fire behavior experts, more than 50% of homes lost during a wildfire catch fire due to flying embers, not direct flame contact or radiant heat. That means that all homes in Malibu are vulnerable.

Fire Safety Liaison Jerry Vandermeulen, who provides the service, is a former Ventura County Fire Captain. He is certified in "Assessing Structure Ignition Potential from Wildfire" through the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) in identifying specific areas that wildfire embers can find receptive fuels in and around a home. He will inspect your home and make recommendations on how to make it more fire resistant. There are simple and often inexpensive ways to make homes safer from wildfire, including modifying landscaping around the home, sealing eaves, and moving flammable materials away from structures.

Vandermeulen has conducted more than 150 home wildfire assessments for homeowners in the City of Malibu since the City launched the program in August 2019.

Vandermeulen is also available to meet with individuals, business owners, homeowners associations, or multifamily residential property owners or managers to offer guidance on brush clearance and home hardening. He can also explain how to monitor wildfire conditions, how to use Pulsepoint and other tools to maintain good situational awareness well in advance of a wildfire, and how to prepare emergency and evacuation plans and supply kits.

Communities with high levels of poverty have a death rate of 29, four times that of affluent communities, said L.A. County Public Health Director Barbara Ferrer.

Ferrer said the county is conducting another antibody test to see what proportion of county residents have had COVID-19 and will focus more on testing communities of color than in the first antibody test. She said the county is also deepening its partnerships with healthcare providers and putting out targeted public service announcements in African American communities.

"We cannot continue to allow inequities in health outcomes," Ferrer said.

Public health officials confirmed on Friday 206 cases of coronavirus among Santa Monica residents, a nearly 26% increase over last Friday. Cases increased about 12% the week before.

There are 87 confirmed cases of COVID-19 among residents and 44 among staff at five nursing homes in Santa Monica, including the Rehabilitation Center, Beachwood and Ocean Pointe. Brentwood Health Care Center and Brookdale Ocean Housing Assisted Living have smaller outbreaks.

The total number of confirmed cases in L.A. County also rose by a quarter over the last week to more than 30,000.

Nearly 215,000 people have been tested and 12% have tested positive.

After announcing April 24 that the county would require nursing homes to test both symptomatic and asymptomatic residents and staff, Ferrer said Friday that 95 nursing homes have completed exhaustive testing. The county will continue to help facilitate testing, prioritizing nursing homes with outbreaks.

There are now 223 confirmed cases among homeless individuals, 135 of whom were sheltered when they contracted the virus. The county is conducting investigations at 23 shelters, Ferrer said.

She said the number of people in the hospital for COVID-19 has remained steady for the last week and a half at nearly 1,800.

As coronavirus continues to spread throughout the county, officials are allowing some retailers to open Friday for curbside pickup. Trails and golf courses will also reopen and visitors must practice physical distancing and wear face coverings.

The county may allow beaches and other types of retailers, manufacturers and recreational facilities to reopen with limitations next week.

The city of Santa Monica on Friday issued several additions to its emergency order that prohibit landlords from collecting interest on unpaid rent, temporarily suspends the city's plastic bag ban and limits loud construction activity to 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on weekdays while stay-at-home orders are in place.

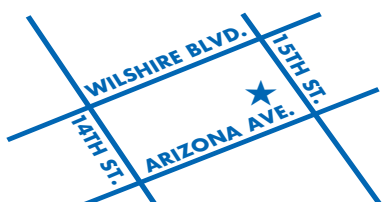

Virus restrictions reimposed amid patchwork re-openings

As coronavirus-induced economic pain grew around the world, some U.S. states moved forward Friday with plans to reopen their economies, while European countries held muted commemorations to mark the end of World War II on the continent.

Around the U.K., residents were encouraged to stand on their doorsteps and sing together while socially distanced to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Allies' victory over Nazi Germany. Meanwhile, South Korea, seen as a model for containing COVID-19, ordered nightclubs closed for a month and considered delaying a school restart after an uptick in coronavirus cases.

Friction arose where national governments disagreed with their local counterparts over business restrictions. In Italy, the government vowed legal action against a province seeking to ease restrictions faster than the country as a whole. In Brazil, the reverse happened as the country's president asked the country's high court to rein in local governments imposing more restrictions than he would like.

A patchwork reopening in the United States included Texas allowing hair salons and barbershops to welcome back customers Friday, while California took more modest steps to let retailers resume curbside operations with employees in masks.

The slow march toward reopening the economy comes as the U.S. reported a jobless rate of 14.7% in April, a level not seen since the Great Depression.

Among those whose finances have been thrown into turmoil is Martin Brossman of Raleigh, North Carolina, who has seen two-thirds of his income as a professional coach and speaker disappear since the pandemic.

"I had thousands of dollars in keynote speaking go away overnight," Brossman said.

He said he wasn't waiting for word on the unemployment benefits he filed for weeks ago. Instead, he is retooling his business for a world that will rely more on remote activities.

"I don't think this is the last time that a problem like this occurs," he said, so "whatever way we can do business ... if this happens again,

we have a new income stream."

Here is a look at COVID-19 developments around the world.

SOMBER V-E DAY

Across Europe, celebrations to mark the May 8, 1945, surrender of Germany were canceled or scaled back dramatically due to the virus. Many were asked to mark the moment in private or from a safe distance.

In the U.K., people were encouraged to sing the iconic wartime anthem, "We'll Meet Again" from their homes — a song with added resonance now as coronavirus lockdowns separate family and friends.

In France, where Victory Day is a public holiday, a strict lockdown prompted a somber commemoration. President Emmanuel Macron led a small ceremony at the Arc de Triomphe, accompanied by two former French presidents, all observing social distancing. Macron used a hand sanitizer after signing the official register.

Elsewhere in Europe, friction arose in Italy as the northern province of Bolzano sought to reopen stores this weekend in defiance of a national plan to wait until later in the month. While the province cited a special statute granting it some autonomy, the Rome government planned a legal challenge in the country, which has recorded more than 217,000 cases and more than 30,200 deaths.

U.S. MAKES SOME MOVES TO REOPEN

In Texas, where the Republican governor was praised by President Donald Trump for loosening business restrictions, hair salons and barber shops were allowed to reopen Friday, following earlier restarts of restaurants and retailers.

California, where the Democratic governor was the first in the U.S. to impose a statewide stay-home order, was taking more modest steps forward. Gov. Gavin Newsom allowed clothing stores, sporting goods, florists and other retailers to start operating curbside pickup Friday, with employees required to wear masks.

The moves came as the U.S. recorded nearly

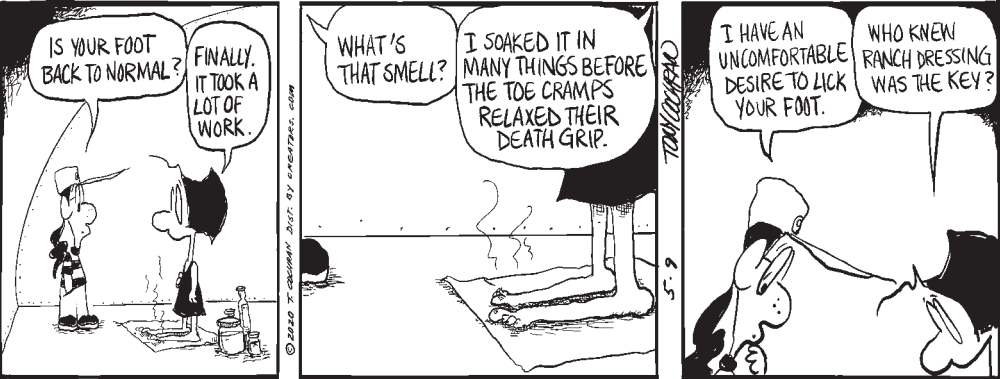

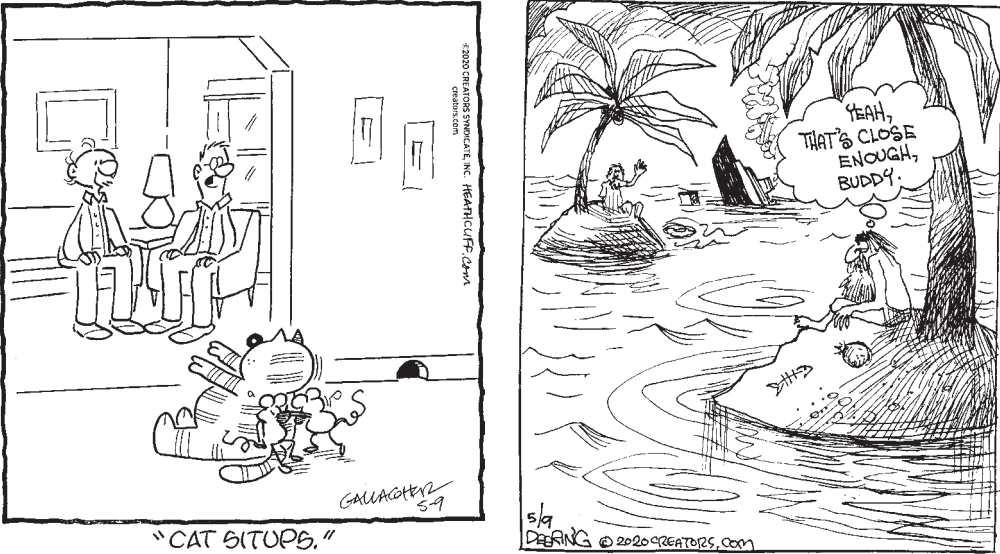
