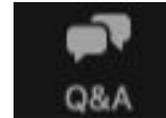

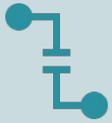

The Problem We're Solving



The Reality: Traditional operating models are no longer sufficient in an era of constant change and rising complexity.

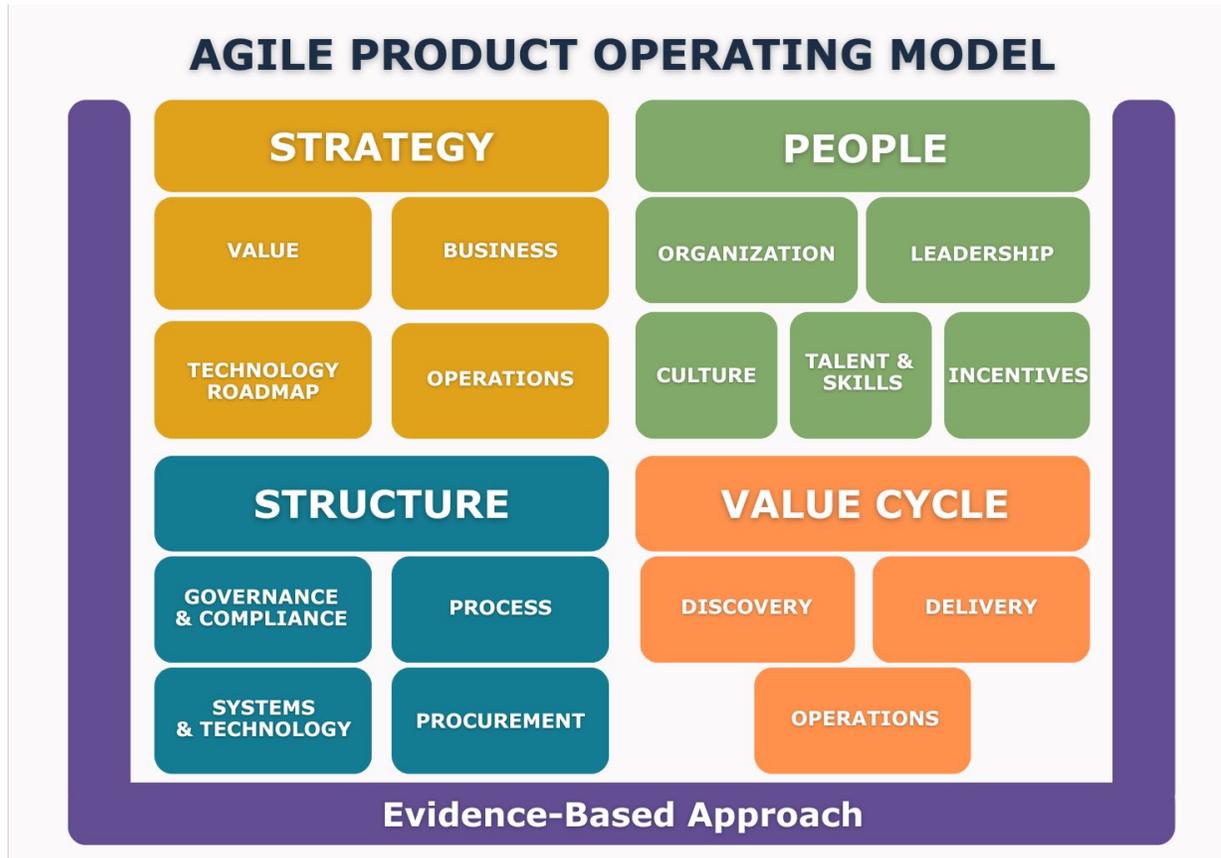


The "Transformation Plateau": Many organizations move beyond waterfall but get stuck in a "Sometimes" mode—having agile vocabulary but lacking agile muscle memory.



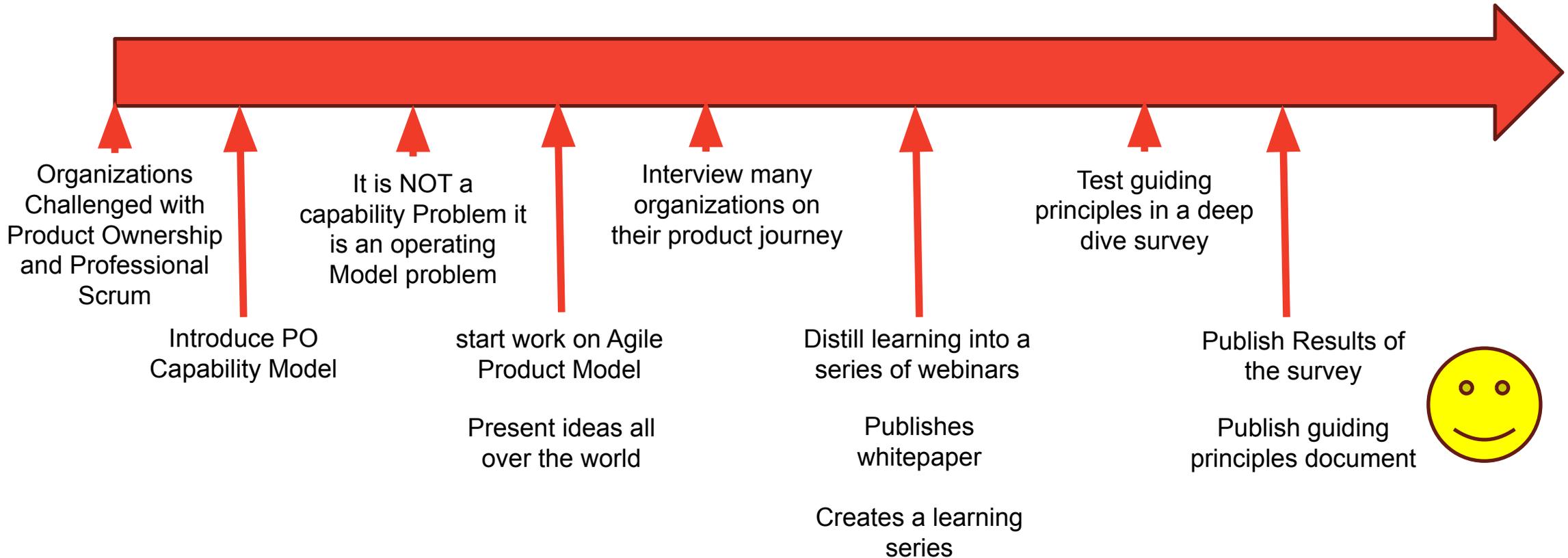
The Danger: This middle ground creates an illusion of progress while outcomes remain inconsistent.

Agile Product Operating Model

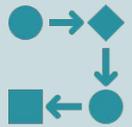


- **A Holistic Approach:** APOM extends Professional Scrum to help organizations deliver value continuously and thrive in uncertainty.
- **Core Principles:** It combines modern product management, agile delivery, and Evidence-Based Management (EBM).
- **Alignment:** The model is designed to align organizational practices clearly with digital goals.

APOM History



The Consistency Crisis



Key Finding: Organizations adopt agile practices on a situational basis rather than systematically.



The Data Trap: High "Sometimes" and low "Always" responses reveal that teams apply principles when convenient, not by default.



The Barrier: This inconsistency is the primary barrier to maturity, leading to unpredictable outcomes.

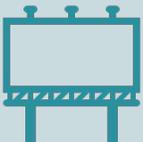
Challenge #1 - The Evidence Gap



Weak Empiricism: Reliance on evidence is weak; 28.7% report decisions are only half evidence-based.

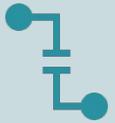


Opinion Rule: 22.1% of organizations rarely use evidence, relying instead on opinions and assumptions.



Innovation Theater: Only 35.2% consistently use data-driven experiments, risking building features without building insights.

Challenge #2 - Portfolio Chaos at Scale



Weakest Link: Portfolio management scored the lowest across all metrics (38.9% effective).



Coordination Failure: 61.7% of respondents report inconsistent cross-product coordination.

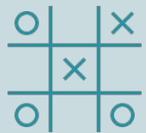


Global Sub-optimization: Without effective portfolio functions, agile teams optimize locally at the expense of the enterprise (e.g., duplicated work, conflicting roadmaps).

Challenge #3 - The Missing Middle



The Disconnect: 52.9% report a product-centric goal, yet only 14.7% report consistent leadership behaviors that empower agile ways of working.



The Impediment: Transformation stalls when middle managers fail to shift from command-and-control to servant-leadership.



Signs of Struggle: Managers demanding detailed upfront plans and measuring utilization rather than outcomes.

Challenge #4 - The Value vs. Features Tension



Prioritization Gap: Only 16.9% of respondents consistently prioritize value over outputs.



Mixed Focus: 63.9% of organizations report a struggle to maintain a consistent "value-first" focus.



Strategic Perception: Product development's role is ambiguous, with 33.1% seeing it as a cost factor as much as a strategic enabler.

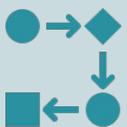
Strategic Recommendations



Value-First Strategy: Establish clear, measurable business-driven outcomes and move beyond feature delivery and deadlines.



Strategic Positioning: Position product development as a source of business or service growth, not merely an operational cost.



Systematic Practice: Commit to systematic, not situational, agile practice to move beyond the transformation plateau.

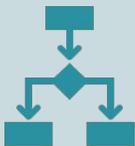
