Current Interest Rates Make ARP a Popular Financial Planning Tool for Farm Families

While the Federal Reserve has halted its campaign of interest rate hikes — for now. Here's what the central bank had to say about the state of the economy and what the move could mean for inflation:

What happened? To curb inflation, the Fed began raising rates over a year ago and continued to do so 10 straight times. The pause is meant to give officials some time to assess whether their aggressive strategy has done enough to cool the economy.

Where does inflation stand? Inflation rose 4% in the year through May, per the Consumer Price Index. That's slightly less than economists projected, but it's still well above the Fed's 2% target.

A silver lining? Rent and airfares are starting to come down, and (blessedly) so is the cost of eggs. Earlier this year, a carton was quite *eggs*-pensive, but in May prices plummeted 13.8%.

A look ahead: Still, inflation has remained stubbornly high, and the Fed is expecting to push two more rate increases. It forecasts inflation to reach 3.2% and unemployment to rise to 4.1% by the end of 2023.

What does that mean for the ARP? Interest rates on our financing mechanism, T-STRIPs, have been going up in tandem with the Feds raising other interest rates, tracking this quarter between 3.8 - 4.1%. This makes it a great time to consider enrolling acres in the Agricultural Reserve Program. Remember, the interest for 25 years is TAX FREE—what other investments can offer this? Contact me to see if your farm qualifies. An application does not obligate you; it merely gives you options. We are here to help.

BEWARE OF CHECK FRAUD!

Now more than ever, we encourage our clients to have their ARP interest and final payments wired to an account of their choosing because check fraud is on the rise.

A recent Associated Press article stated that U.S. Banks issued approximately 680,000 instances of check fraud last year, up from 350,000 in 2021. In addition, the U.S. Postal Service had an estimated 300,000 complaints of mail theft in 2021, more than double the prior year.

Government relief checks sent out during the pandemic became a high value target for criminals and the problem has been on the rise since. Officials are warning Americans to avoid mailing checks when possible.

Criminals are literally fishing mail out of U.S. postal boxes looking for envelopes that appear to be bill payments or checks being mailed to consumers.

The most common type of check fraud is called check washing, where the check is stolen from the mail and the payee and amount are changed on the check and then cashed by the criminal. We have of instances of check heard right washing here at the Courthouse area post office and from some of our friends and neighbors. So please remain vigilant!

If you are a current ARP client and still receive a paper check, we urge you to consider switching to wire payments. There may be a fee associated with each wire transaction, but it is likely worth the peace of mind to know that your money is safe. We are here to help you with the paperwork to make those changes with our paying agent, US Bank.

Saving for Occasional Expenses







We all have bills we must pay each month, but sometimes we find ourselves unprepared when occasional expenses arrive. Occasional expenses are referred to as irregular, periodic, or seasonal expenses. Personal property taxes, car insurance, auto inspections, tuition, school-related expenses, and gifts are among occasional expenses.

Oftentimes when individuals develop their Spending and Saving Plans (also known as budget) they may forget about the occasional expenses, which can cause havoc on the budget if these expenses are not planned. Without a plan to pay these expenses, most people must find other sources to pay their bills including using loans and credit cards to meet their financial obligations. Occasional expenses are as important as monthly expenses such as car and home payments.

There are a couple of methods to identify your occasional expenses without struggling to find ways to juggle your money to pay these expenses when they arrive. The best method to identify occasional expenses would be to look back at your spending patterns and plan for future spending. Review your bank statements and credit card statements to identify the bills you pay on a quarterly, bi-annual, or yearly basis. Holidays and birthdays expenses may be a little easier to plan for because they happen at the same time, and we usually spend about the same amount each year.

Once you identify your occasional expenses then determine the amount of money you will need to pay, the time-frame, and then divide the amount by the number of months you will have until the payment is due. Remember the time-frame may be once a year, twice yearly, or every quarter. Make sure to divide the amount of the expense equally according to the months you have until the bill is due. For example, you pay \$250.00 each June for your vehicle's personal property taxes. Divide

continued - Saving for Occasional Expenses

\$250.00 by 12 months would be \$20.83 per month which should be reflected on your Spending and Savings Plan as a monthly expense. Another example could be your car insurance of \$400.00 every quarter. Divide \$400.00 by 3 months equally would be \$133.33 per month. This amount should be reflected as a monthly expense on your Spending and Savings Plan.

Once you identified the amount for your occasional expenses, the next step would be to open a savings account with your bank or credit union, entitle the account as "Occasional Expenses" and deposit the specified money into the account for each expense. The money must be moved from the checking account into the "Occasional Expenses" account. Many times, when the money is not moved into the account, it is easily spent on other items. For expenses that occur once a year, you may consider opening a special account entitled "Back to School Club" or "Holiday Savings Club". You can have money automatically transferred into these special accounts; however, you will not be able to withdraw money from these accounts until the maturity date without a penalty. The maturity date is usually indicated when you open the account.

Having these savings accounts for Occasional Expenses will help reduce the stress of finding money to pay these expenses and you will no longer need to do the juggling act with your money. Also having these special savings accounts will reduce the need to use credit to pay the expenses causing even more burden on your finances. Just imagine how wonderful it would be for your financial situation to pay your monthly expenses and have money to pay the occasional expenses.


