Flood Protection Plan Overview

- The Flood Protection Program includes a bond referendum of \$567 million which was voted on in 2021.
- Over 70% of citizens voted to approve the bond referendum.
- There are more than 40 projects in phase 1 of the Flood Protection Program.
- Virginia Beach faces flooding threats from all directions which is influenced by storm events and wind direction.

Communications

- The new city logo and website were rolled out during the centralization process.
- The centralization of communications began around 2022-2023 to improve efficiency and consistency.
- The communications office includes various teams focusing on internal communications, public engagement, video production, social media, media relations, and design.
- 150 posts published related to the Flood Protection Program from September 2023 to July 2025.
- 43 blogs posted from September 2023 to July 2025 with over 26,000 views, averaging 615 views per blog.
- Over 122,000 views on "How it Works" videos, primarily on Instagram.
- The Friday city weekly email newsletter reaches about 12,000 recipients.
- The Flood Protection Program's engagement on Facebook is significantly higher than the industry average.
- A \$500 Facebook ad boost resulted in significant engagement and follower increase.
- The annual budget for paid advertising for the department is \$1,000, with a recent test of \$500.
- The fourth grade Flood initiative is complete and will go to VBCPS for teachers to teach.
- Communications team will explore setting up direct email lists for targeted project information.
- Communications team will explore the use of reels and engaging with local influencers for better outreach.

Back Bay Restoration Project Concerns

- The Back Bay Restoration Project is currently on life support due to various challenges and may require legislative changes.
- There are about 300 acres in Back Bay, in about 50 acres Submerged Aquatic Vegetation (SAV) has shown up. When the program started there was 0% SAV.
- The city plans to go to Richmond in November to seek legislative support for the Back Bay Restoration Project.
- If changes are made to the design, the joint permit application process starts over.
