## **Status Report**

- Kyle Coolbaugh to present to City Council on October 7<sup>th</sup> regarding the Stormwater Extension program.
- A public meeting on the Central Resort District is scheduled for Oct. 2<sup>nd</sup> at 6 p.m.
- The budget for the Flood protection programs increased from over \$1 Billion to \$1.5 Billion, primarily due to Windsor Woods, Princess Anne Plaza, and The Lakes projects moving to baseline.
- The preliminary cost estimates occurred in 2020 and now the projects have more refined baseline numbers.
- 4.1 cents on the mill rate is allocated to the Flood Protection Program.
- Board members expressed concern about the public's reaction to the increased project costs.
- Coastal Storm Risk Management (CSRM) aims for a 15% reduction in flood insurance premiums, targeting a future goal of 25%.
- The national Coastal Resiliency Fund Grant awarded to the City for the Marsh Restoration project exceeded its performance period, leading to a return of \$9.9 million.
- If the Marsh Restoration project gets back on track, a reapplication for the grant will be pursued.

# PW Operations – Maintaining our existing storm infrastructure

- 800 BMPs throughout the city with 300 of them being little lakes with different configurations.
- The city currently has the following tide gates: Shore Drive corridor, Asheville Park, Cape Henry, and a fourth one about to come online with Windsor Woods.
- 60 miles of larger ditches throughout the city.
- The city currently has 17 pump stations in operation.
- Almost 4,000 miles of pipes and over 40,000 manholes.
- Operations is structured into three main groups: Maintenance and Inspection, Construction and Engineering, and Mosquito Control.
- The asset management program has categorized 390 assets for better tracking and maintenance.
- Proactive cleaning has removed nearly 10,000 cubic yards of sediment, reducing service calls.
- The pipe cleaning group is divided into preventative and reactive sections, with the preventative crew established in FY21.
- The goal is to clean 1,000 miles of the system in five years.
- The city conducts pavement surveys every three to five years to assess street conditions.
